# NEWS ON THE STREETS

The Streets Division of Public Services and Works continues to maintain and upgrade your local streets. Work started on Fremont last fall in preparation for the work completed in May. Last fall, all of the curbs and gutters were replaced at the intersection to insure water flow. Streets crews replaced the curb and gutters at each of the alley intersections. In April, the asphalt layer was placed to level the street and provide a smoother surface. After the asphalt had cured, a double chip seal was put down. This is the same process that we used on Stewart Street. Stewart and Fremont are very heavily traveled streets and the repairs were long overdue.

The following streets between Haskell and Railroad Avenue are planned for chip seal to round out this fiscal year: **Delos, Grant, McCourt, Wasson, Soto, and Parker**. With HURF funds being reduced almost yearly, the 1% sales tax approved by the Mayor and Council a number of years ago, is what is allowing us continue to move forward.

# **Backyard Safety**

As summer approaches, homeowners need to take the time to check their outdoor areas for potential safety hazards. While most people know that pools are a safety hazard for kids, there are lot more things to watch out for in your back yard, like barbecues and grills, lawn equipment and toys. Zero to low cost simple steps can help to keep your family and friends safe in the future:

• Practice constant, adult supervision around any body of water, including pools and spas.

• If you're considering a swimming pool purchase, contact your local Building Department first to determine exactly what permits are needed and what requirements you must follow.

• Designate the grilling area a "No Play Zone" and keep kids and pets well away until grill equipment is completely cool.

- Check propane cylinder hoses for leaks before use. (Source: USFA)
- Do not move hot grills.

• Never add charcoal starter fluid when coals or kindling have already been ignited, and never use any flammable or combustible liquid other than charcoal starter fluid to get the fire going.

• Dispose of charcoal properly, keeping ash containers outside and away from combustible construction.

• Place the grill away from siding, deck railings and out from under eaves and overhanging branches.

• Your Willcox Fire Department ask you not to use charcoal and gas grills and other open burning devices on combustible porches or within 10 feet of combustible construction.

- Don't leave toys, tools and equipment in the yard.
- Reserve a spot on a wall or fence near the pool for lifesaving devices.
- Keep steps, sidewalks and patios in good repair.

• A common safety hazard occurs when porches are nailed to buildings rather than being attached with the proper anchors or bolts. Nails are a poor method for attaching porches to buildings because they work their way loose over time.

• Check all swings, slides, playhouses and other structures for sharp objects, rusty metal pieces, breaks or weakened support pieces.

• Learn cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR).
