As part of the celebration of the 100 years of Statehood, the Union Pacific Railroad is bringing a Steam Locomotive to Willcox! The Locomotive is scheduled to arrive in Willcox from Lordsburg at approximately 10 A.M.

The Locomotive will be parked on the tracks by Railroad Park for about 30 minutes before it continues on its journey across Arizona.

The Library Needs Your Help!

Last month, I gave you 101 great reasons to read. This month, I want to give you the **key** to making that happen. What sort of key? Simple, it is your **Library Card** – the most important card in your purse or wallet. It is your FREE ticket to ride! It is your passport to the World, and to explore and enjoy all of those 101 reasons to read!

Most people in our community have a library card – that is a fact. But sadly, another fact is – most people (7 or 8 out of 10) don't bother to bring their card in to the Library with them – and we *really* need for you to do that. And yes, we have heard 101 different reasons why they didn't. Like most things, it just becomes a habit, and like most bad habits, it is a hard one to break, but please, it will make life so much better, for you and for us.

One little thing like bringing your Library Card in with you makes a world of difference, and helps us serve you better. Here is why - I'll bet you did not know that we serve about 150 people a day on average, here at the Library. That is 900 per week, 3500 per month, and about 42,000 people a year! And we do that with just four people on staff and a small handful of volunteers. Now, each person that comes in without a library card, needing a computer, or wanting to check out some books or other media, takes anywhere from two to five minutes extra time (on avg) for us to serve them. Staff tells me that nearly 8 out of 10 people do not bring their card in with them. Let's do the math: $42,000 \times 80\% = 33,600 \times 4$ minutes = 134,400 extra service time minutes, divided by 60 = 2,280 hours! That is 200 hours *more* than having another full-time person on staff. We are already short one full-time person on staff. We don't *have* that 2,280 hours to spare. Now do you see how, by doing

one simple little thing like bringing your library card in with you, you can help us help you? It will reduce your waiting time *and* compensate for not having that staff person.

There are four big plusses to having your library card with you: (1) No waiting lines to check out materials – you can use the self-checkout machine; (2) No waiting lines to reserve a computer – you can scan your card and self-reserve your computer; (3) If you do need our help, with your card we go straight into your account, pay your bills, renew your books, etc, and we save you (and us) that 5 extra minutes! That is efficiency in action. There is one more very important reason to always bring your card in with you, and that is: (4) If our operating system is down or we have a power outage, the ONLY way we can check anything in or out to you, is by tying those items to your card number. Please bring your card in, and help us help you. Thank you!

So what does the City do anyway?

Often we don't know what the City of Willcox does for the people of the Community. What services are actually being provided? What services are not being provided and why not?
